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# **CHIEF ALBERT LUTHULI FOR** THE NOBEL **PEACE PRIZE** IN 1961

#### The 2021 Chief Albert Luthuli **Memorial Lecture**

On 10 December 2021, the Luthuli Museum in partnership with the Department of Sport, Arts and Culture and the University of KwaZulu Natal presented the annual Chief Albert Luthuli Memorial Lecture. Premised on the celebration of the 60th anniversary of the Nobel Peace Prize. The lecture was themed, 'Africa and Freedom'. Chief Albert Luthuli when receiving the Nobel Peace Prize in his acceptance speech in Oslo, dedicated the peace prize to Africa.

The 2021 Annual Chief Albert Luthuli Memorial lecture keynote address by the former President of the Republic of South Africa Mr. Thabo Mbeki was a reminder of the tumultuous journey South Africa and Africa had to take towards attaining democracy. For former President, Mr. Thabo Mbeki stated in his keynote address, the most important message about Chief Albert Luthuli receiving the Nobel Peace Prize was Chief Luthuli commitment to the African cause. This commitment was about socio-economic and political justice. Chief Luthuli remained dedicated to this cause throughout his life.

For former President Thabo Mbeki, Chief Luthuli deliberately bound South African and African leaders to the cause for which he received the Nobel Peace Prize in Oslo, Norway, in December 1961, he dedicated the Award in these words: "I therefore regard this award as a recognition of the sacrifice made by many of all

races, particularly the African people, who have endured and suffered so much for so long. It can only be on behalf of the people of South Africa, all the people of South Africa, especially the freedom-loving people, that I accept this award, that I acknowledge this honour. I accept it also as an honour not only to South Africa, but for the whole continent of Africa, to this continent, Mother Africa!"

In his keynote, former President Mbeki states, "I believe that those of us to whom Chief Luthuli dedicated the Nobel Peace Prize - who belong among those he described as 'millions who have dedicated their lives to the service of mankind' - and who lived to see the new South Africa being born need to pose and answer the important questions - is everything that has happened in South Africa and the rest of Africa consonant with what Chief Luthuli sacrificed for and what have been and are our responsibilities in this regard?"-Perhaps to add to this question, it is important to ask, do we appreciate the sacrifices made by Chief Luthuli when we live during times where South Africa faces the challenge of moral decay, the scourge of gender-based, adverse poverty, inequality and racial intolerance? Do we even ponder and ask why Chief Luthuli was so committed to the principle of non-violence? Probably everyone should try to answer these auestions.

The lecture also revisited the fundamental principles of leadership. It should be remembered that Chief Luthuli subscribed to the notion

of the gospel of service and sacrifice. He believed a leader should always put his people first, ahead of personal selfish interest. Unfortunately, leadership today has suffered and denigrated to the level of patronage politics, greed and politics of accumulation, an antithesis of Chief Luthuli's understanding of leadership. This is the paradox of the post-1994 dispensation. It is contrary to what leadership should be about. The generation of Chief Luthuli knew the dangers of being consumed by an appetite for power and wealth, hence they subscribed to the notion of servant leadership whose interest was a gospel of service and always putting people first.

The lecture touched on the idea of Pan Africanism, the idea of a united Africa, not a compartmentalised Africa that is weakened by boundaries, where resources and labour are siphoned and extracted to other developed countries of the world to the detriment of Africa. This idea of a united Africa was very important for Chief Luthuli. He saw the struggle for freedom in South Africa as not separated from struggle in Africa. This was also reflected in Chief Luthuli's acceptance speech when he dedicated the award to South Africa and the continent of Africa, thus calling for a symbiotic approach to Africa's problems.

The lecture was a hybrid event; a live broadcast on SABC Channel 404 and SAFM and received interviews on Vuma FM, Vibe FM, uKhozi FM, Intokozo FM and Khwezi FM. The annual lecture is a broadcast in English. However, uKhozi FM translated former President's speech to IsiZulu Language as well. The full recording of the speech is available on YouTube.



## The Luthuli Museum Moot Court Competition for high schools 2021

The University of KwaZulu Natal-Howard College in partnership with the Luthuli Museum successfully staged the Schools Moot Court Competition, at KwaDukuza Magistrate Court on 18 October 2021. The event saw eight learners from Mbhekamuzi Secondary School assuming different court proceedings roles.

In preparation for the competition, a team of UKZN Law School academics and Street Law students ran six sessions of training workshops in June and July with the learners, on the Constitution and human rights Law and how to prepare legal arguments.

The Moot Court program is part of a community upliftment initiative undertaken by the School of Law's Street Law programme, which aims to create greater

awareness in schools and communities (mostly disadvantaged communities) about the justice system, the Constitution, and the Bill of Rights, and to encourage young learners to consider pursuing a career in law. Through this program, final year students as part of their course requirements, are required to complete 20 outreach lessons on law and human rights and have successfully taught basic legal knowledge to school learners, civil society groupings and communities.

The Luthuli Museum approached the University of KwaZulu Natal School of Law and formed partnership to fulfil parts of its mission to uphold and promote the values and philosophies of the late Chief Albert Luthuli in respect for human rights. In so doing museum engages in the Moot Court for high schools in an aid to raise awareness about South African Justice System.

On the day of the competition, the learners presented their legal arguments at the Court, in front of the presiding Magistrate Rose Sepeng, representatives from the

Luthuli Museum, representatives from the University of KwaZulu Natal and supporters of the learners.

The winning pupil Mbali Masinga was awarded a bursary by the Dean of the Law School, Prof. Managay Reddi, to undertake an LL B degree at UKZN, should she wish to pursue a career in law. Runners up, Precious Dlamini, Nkosingiphile Ncube and Nkululeko Ncance were awarded trophies and certificates of participation.

Each year, as it unfolds, the museum engages in collaborative programmes and partnerships to ensure that the commemoration of the life of Chief Albert Luthuli and Mrs. Nokukhanya Luthuli is experienced and remembered by South Africans at large and all those who hold dear his contribution to the building of a better world for all. As much for appreciation to the University of KwaZulu Natal- Street Law their contribution to this program has seen this program become an annual program.

### THE 60th NOBEL PEACE PRIZE LAUREATE CHIEF ALBERT HONOURED THROUGH SOCCER TOURNAMENT
