Director-General: World Trade Organization (WTO) DR NGOZI OKONJO-IWEALA to deliver the 19th Chief Albert Luthuli Memorial Lecture

Issue Date: Wednesday, 12 November 2025

The Department of Sport, Arts & Culture; Luthuli Foundation and Luthuli Museum in partnership with the University of KwaZulu-Natal will host the 19th Chief Albert Luthuli Memorial Lecture on Thursday, 20 November 2025, 4pm at the University of KwaZulu Natal- Westville Campus.

Themed, 'Reflecting on the work of the world trade organisation and its global impact', Dr Okonjo-lweala's address will reflect on the WTO's global impact since its establishment 30 years ago. This lecture will reflect on the promotion of free and fair trade between countries, resolving trade disputes and maintaining cooperation between countries and other international economic institutions.

It will also reflect on post-colonial economies' initiatives of interregional trade and integration like those in Africa and South America and whether they stand a chance of sustainable success in the current global economic trade system characterised by tensions between countries and competing interests. Further, it will look at the challenges that the advent of Artificial Intelligence (AI) might pose to intellectual property and international trade; and how can these challenges be addressed.

Dr Okonjo-Iweala is a global finance expert, an economist and international development professional who has over 40 years of experience working in Asia, Africa, Europe, Latin America and North America, 'Dr Okonjo-Iweala. Dr Okonjo-Iweala was formerly the Chair of the Board of Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, Global Commission on the Economy, Climate and the World Bank.

Chief Albert Luthuli, Africa's First Nobel Peace Prize recipient for 1960, made his contribution to world peace, friendship, and human dignity. He believed that the world had become 'a neighbourhood' and therefore countries needed to work together to ensure peace and prosperity for all their inhabitants; In his 1961 Nobel Peace Prize speech, he remarked that, 'humanity longs for a time when great powers of the world become great at heart and curb their ambitions and pave the way for settling of their differences in a statesman like manner and thus remove the threat of war'.

The 2025 Albert Luthuli Lecture will present an opportunity to engage with the speaker on the work of the World Trade Organisation (WTO) and its global impact. The lecture will be on Luthuli Museum ZOOM platform or by physical attendance. It will also be live streamed on the Luthuli Museum YouTube channel.
